From the desk of the Chief



Summer is almost here and already people are out and about enjoying the longer days and warm weather. For many, this time of year allows for a slower, more casual lifestyle. Along with that, at the police department, come increased calls for service - as well as for code enforcement – on ‘issues’ that folks observe while coming and going at a more relaxed pace such as:

- graffiti on private property
- neglected landscape/overgrown lots
- illegal dumping of garbage and debris on private property
- abandoned and/or inoperable vehicles on private property
- setback regulations, fence height
- animal keeping
- major automotive repair in residential zone
- junk, trash, furniture, construction material, etc. visible to the public
- occupied recreational vehicles
- broken fences
- overgrown foliage blocking/impeding sight of driveways, sidewalks, roadways, and/or making corners dangerous
- large commercial vehicles (e.g. semi-trucks) parked in residential neighborhoods
- vacant unmaintained homes
- residential businesses causing traffic/noise problems
- residential rental housing complaints (i.e. owners not making repairs or addressing housing issues making the residence unlivable)

These are all concerns which our Code Enforcement Unit should be informed and there are several ways to do so. You can complete our on-line service request (at www.citrusheights.net – click on the “City Hall On-Line” tab), telephone (916) 725-2845, or send an email to servicerequestnep@citrusheights.net. Please be prepared with specific information such as the address of the property, detailed description of the situation, and the length of time you have observed it to be so. Complaints can be made anonymously; your identity will not be disclosed. Too often we see blight such as graffiti, weeds, etc., and assume someone else has already reported the issue. This is not always the case so please take a moment and use one of the several available reporting methods to inform us of these and other community issues.

Police staff responds to code enforcement complaints according to the seriousness of the violation, and its effect on the community. Situations that appear to pose a serious risk to health and safety are given top priority; others are pursued in the order in which they are received. For all types of code complaints, the first step in the follow-up procedure is to issue a warning letter requesting compliance. If the individual responsible for the situation is not available, or appears unwilling to voluntarily correct the code violation in a timely manner, a notice of violation or a citation may be issued. The city may also take court action if the situation poses a significant risk to the community, or if the individual has ignored previous notices/citations. In all cases, the individual responsible for the code violation is given the opportunity to voluntarily correct the situation and comply with current codes without a penalty. If the correction is not made, then the individual may be subject to fines and other penalties including a certificate of nuisance placed on the property clouding the title. We cannot be everywhere all the time and rely on our citizens to help be our eyes and ears. By working together, we can ensure that our city remains a safe and welcoming place in which to live, work, and play.



Citrus Heights Police Department

The Citrus Heights Police Department is committed to finding innovative ways to help make our community secure and safe for its citizens. In an effort to reduce the number of stolen vehicles in Citrus Heights we offer the Battle Auto Theft, or simply "BAT", Program to our community and our residents. The Battle Auto Theft (BAT) Program is a free program for citizens who have vehicles registered in Citrus Heights.

Auto theft is a problem that exists in every major city in the United States and certainly is not uncommon in smaller communities, like ours. Impacts to auto theft victims are many including expenses related to vehicle replacement, inconvenience and future insurance costs. Consequently, combating auto theft in our community becomes crucial.

The majority of stolen vehicles occur during the hours of 1am and 5am, probably while you are sleeping. It's unlikely that you would even know that you've been a victim of this crime until the following morning. By that time, your vehicle may have already been used in the commission of a crime and abandoned at an undisclosed location.

Registration is easy. Just come by the Citrus Heights Police Department Monday-Friday 8 am-5 pm or Saturday 9 am-2 pm with the vehicle you would like to sign up for the program. You will be asked to fill out a registration form and our staff will affix a serialized sticker onto the back window of your registered vehicle. This sticker will alert our officers that participants in this program are not likely to be driving during those hours therefore the officers can focus on the investigation of a possible auto theft and conduct a traffic stop on the vehicle if it is being driven during the hours of 1 am-5 am.

In closing, it is partnerships and innovative strategies being implemented by the police department and community that will ultimately reduce crime and the fear of crime within our neighborhoods. Programs, such as Battle Auto Theft, are instrumental in addressing the needs of our community. We will continue to identify means to provide high level and responsive police services to our community.

Curbside Recycling

Where does your recycling go after you place it on the curb? Most of you know that it is picked up by Republic Services with their “big blue truck,” but have no idea where it goes after it leaves your home. Welcome to the world of recycling!

All recyclable material is taken to the Elder Creek Transfer Station in South Sacramento. A transfer station is exactly what the name describes: recyclable materials are transferred from Republic’s big blue residential trucks to “potbelly” long hauling freight trucks. The material is then transported to the Newby Island Material Recovery Facility, or MRF (pronounced “murf”), located in Milpitas, CA. The co-mingled recyclable material --paper, plastic, metal, glass, and cardboard-- are placed on conveyor belts and specially engineered equipment for sorting. The material is then separated both by hand and machine in order to achieve a commodity specific end product. Once separated, the recyclable material is sent through the baler where it is compacted into bales weighing up to 1200 pounds, tied together with wire then loaded on to trucks for shipping to their final destinations.



To give you an idea of the efficiency of this process, if you were to recycle an aluminum soda can today, that same can could be collected, separated, crushed, compacted, shipped, melted down, and created into a brand new “store ready” soda can in as little as 60 days.

Remember, in Citrus Heights you can recycle glass, metal, paper, plastic, and cardboard in your residential recycle bin. If you are ever unsure whether an item is recyclable or not, a complete list of recyclable materials can be found in the 2015 Citrus Heights Customer Service Guide under the month of June. If you are still unsure whether an item is recyclable or have other questions about your service, call Republic Services Customer Service Department at (916) 638-9000 or (916) 725-9060.

The facility at Newby Island is seven stories high, and if you laid all the conveyor belts end to end, they would stretch over a mile and a half!

Medical Office Building/ City Hall Project Update

During the construction of the Medical Office Building and new City Hall, the City's administrative offices will temporarily relocate to the Grand Oaks Shopping Center at 7927 Auburn Boulevard. The last day of business for the existing City Hall (6237 Fountain Square Drive) will be July 9, 2015. City Hall will be closed from July 10-13, 2015. Although City Hall will be closed, the Building and Safety Division will continue to complete scheduled inspections on July 10 and 13. City Hall will reopen for business at the temporary location (7927 Auburn Boulevard) at 8:00 a.m. on July 14, 2015.



On July 18, 2015, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. the City will host a Community Cash and Carry Day at 6237 Fountain Square Drive. At the event, community members will have the opportunity to purchase roses, shrubs, trees, fountains, statues, and planters from the site of the former Fountain Square Nursery. Participants will be responsible for unearthing, loading, and transporting any purchased items. In addition, all participants will be required to sign a waiver and children under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. 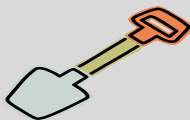

Project	Description	Status
Parkoaks Creek Bank Restoration Project - Brooktree Creek	Improvements to the creek bank at Parkoaks Drive and Brooktree Creek to prevent further creekbank erosion.	Construction expected to commence in August.
2015 Residential Street Resurfacing Program	Resurfacing of 18 residential streets throughout the City.	Construction expected to begin in July and take approximately 3 months to complete.
Sunrise Boulevard Complete Streets Project - Phase III	Pedestrian safety improvements along Sunrise from Antelope Road to Northern city Limits. Project will focus on the west side of Sunrise, and construct sidewalk, curb, and gutter; install access ramps and ADA upgrades and medians at the Twin Oaks intersection; modify the median on Sunrise north of Antelope; install street lights; resurface the entire roadway; and re-stripe traffic and bicycle lanes.	Utility relocation work has begun and is expected to be completed by mid July. Full construction to start in early July. Total project time is estimated at 7 months.
Sunrise Boulevard / Sungarden Drive Signalization Improvement Project	Installation of a signalized intersection on Sunrise at Sungarden to improve traffic and pedestrian safety. Improvements will also include enhanced accessibility along both sides of Sunrise within the project area.	Traffic Signal was energized on May 21. Project now substantially complete with a few punch list items remaining.
Twin Oaks Avenue / Mariposa Avenue Drainage Improvements Project	Add drainage pipes and improve drainage ditches along Mariposa and Twin Oaks Avenue to increase drainage capacity and reduce risk of flooding.	Construction expected to commence in June.
Sylvan Road Accessibility and Safety Improvements Project	Pedestrian safety improvement, with sidewalk installation on east side of Sylvan Road from just south of Bayside Church to San Juan Road. Additional intersection improvements at Stock Ranch Road and Sylvan Road.	Construction expected to begin in July and take approximately 4 months to complete.
2015 Street and Bus Stop Improvement Project	Project will overlay on various streets, construct ADA accessibility enhancements at various bus stops and construct pedestrian and vehicle safety related improvements on Old Auburn Road at the Wachtel Way and Oakwood Hill Drive intersections.	Construction will begin in June and be completed in July.

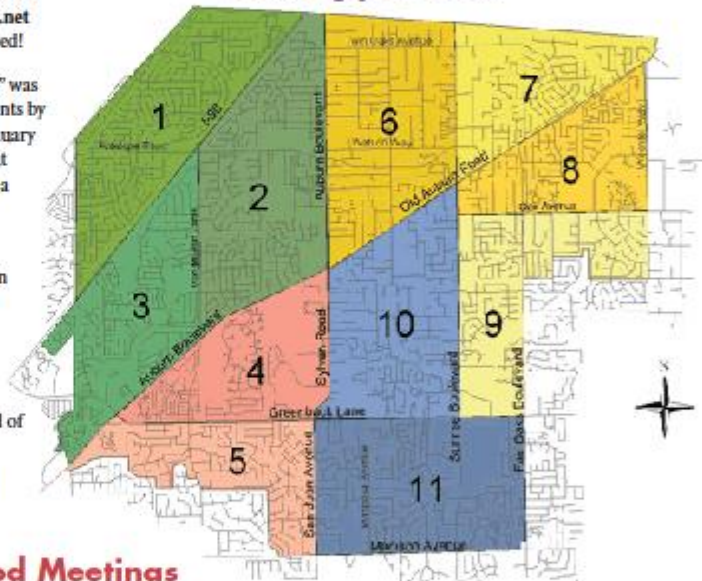

Citrus Heights First-Time Homebuyer Program

Need Help Purchasing a Home? THE CITY CAN HELP!

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

Low-Interest Loans

The low-interest loan is structured as a second mortgage. The loan will have a rate of 3.00%, a term of 30 years with no required monthly payments. The total sum of the loan, with interest, will be due at the end of the 30-year term, upon sale or transfer of the property or if the borrower no longer occupies the home as their primary residence. The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.

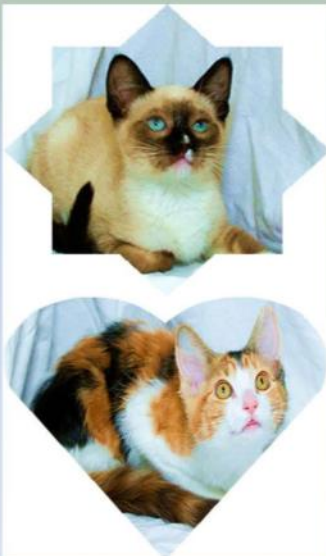
