From the Office of the Chief




Just as in January, statistics for February 2018 continue to trend down when compared to February of 2017. Violent crime overall dropped by 14% with aggravated assault down by three percent, and simple assault down 26% when compared to February 2017. Homicide and rape remain unchanged for the same period and robbery remains the only violent crime category seeing an increase with two more incidents than last year.

Property crime in Citrus Heights for February continues to see a decrease as well at 17% compared to February 2017. Burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and arson-related offenses were down for this month with 86 fewer total incidents overall than during the same period last year.

Overall, traffic collisions saw a decrease of 30% when compared to February 2017. Property damage collisions decreased by 27%, injury collisions were down 32%, and there have been no fatal collisions during this time. DUI collisions saw a reduction of 25% overall.


While CHPD continues to focus on vehicle burglaries and DUI enforcement, we are also engaging with the community on a regular basis. In the month of March, we hosted and participated in Tip-A-Cop at Texas Roadhouse and were able to raise over \$4,000 for the Special Olympics of Northern California being held in June of 2018. We also hosted a "Coffee with a Cop" at Pastor's Valero Espresso Bar on Sunrise and were able to meet some of our community members. We are so grateful for the continued support we receive from the community and look forward to future events.



MOST BATTERIES ARE 100% RECYCLABLE!

Batteries are hazardous waste. Putting batteries in your trash cart means your batteries will end up in the landfill. This is dangerous for the driver who picks them up as adding pressure to batteries can cause fires. When batteries break down in a landfill, they release toxic metals that can leach into the ground, contaminating soiil and underground water. This is why it's against the law to throw away batteries in the trash cart. Republic Services will pick up your *household batteries* and ensure they are properly recycled. Just put your household batteries in a clear sealable bag on top of your blue cart and Republic Services will take care of the rest. *Remember to tape both sides of your lithium batteries before recycling them!





Graffiti Reporting

Keeping the city clean and presentable is a team effort! If you are witnessing tagging or graffiti in progress, please call the Citrus Heights Police Department non-emergency number, (916) 727-5500. Report graffiti on public property to the General Services Department by our online app, city website (citrusheights.net), or by phone, (916) 727-4770.


- Location—Is it public or private property? Where is it (address or intersection) and what type of object is the graffiti on (walls, poles, utility box, bus stops, bridges, etc.)? When graffiti is on private property, the property owner will be advised by the Code Enforcement Division to fix the problem.
- 2. Markings or words—Report certain symbols, signatures, or if words are used to help identify trends in the area. Knowing the color helps staff visually find the graffiti faster.
- 3. **Photos**—sending a photo can help staff locate the problem faster. Our graffiti removal contractors also take pictures for a before and after reference.
- Removal—pressure washing, painting and chemical cleaning are all methods used by the city to remove unsightly graffiti from public property.

- Keep 3 feet between cans & other objects and 6 feet between vehicles & large objects!
- 2. Place cans out by 6 AM on your pick up day! Bring carts in as soon as possible!

Fire Camp Lets Kids Be Firefighters for a Week

Sacramento County, CA - Metro Fire recently opened the application period for Fire Camp, a day camp that takes place from June 19 – 22, 2018. Fire Camp provides local children an once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to experience today's fire service, first hand. The program is designed to instill self-confidence, teamwork, teach life safety skills and provide a basic understanding of the firefighting profession, in a fun and exciting atmosphere.

Campers are grouped in "strike teams" of eight campers, and each strike team is mentored by two Metro Firefighters. Campers learn valuable life safety skills, while discovering what it means to be a firefighter.

To attend Fire Camp, applicants must be 11, 12 or 13 years of age, with preference given to those living within Metro Fire's boundaries. Applications are processed in the order in which they are received, so apply early for a better chance of securing a spot. Deadline to apply is May 25, 2018.

THE PLANNING DIVISION

The Planning Division coordinates the City's review of residential and commercial development projects. The Division evaluates the project for compliance with the City's General Plan, Zoning Code, and other City Standards.

Below is a selected list of projects currently under review:

7925 Arcadia Drive – Mitchell Farms. An application was received to develop a 39 acre parcel into a new development with a variety of housing types for a total of 261 units. The project is currently in the environmental review process.

6920 Auburn Boulevard – Stock Ranch Pad Building. An application is under review to allow the construction of a 10,000 sf multi-tenant pad building within the Stock Ranch Development.

7000 Auburn Boulevard – Costco Gas Station Expansion. An application is under review that would allow the addition of 3 pump dispensers (6 filling locations) to the existing gas station.

7078 Auburn Boulevard – Auburn Heights: An application was received requesting a tentative map, design review permit, and minor variance to construct an 8-unit attached single-family development on a small infill lot.

7911 Auburn Boulevard – Rally's Burger: An application to develop the vacant southwest corner of Auburn Boulevard and Grand Oaks (in front of Fireside Lanes) with a hamburger stand.

THE PLANNING DIVISION

5905 Country Lane – Expansion of Country Lane Apartments: An application to construct an additional 7 townhome-style apartment units within an existing apartment community is under review by the Planning Division.

7117 Oakberry Way – Well Reactivation: Cal-Am Water is proposing to reactivate a non-operational well. The reactivation will include the installation of a new pump system and storage equipment.

7534 Old Auburn Road – Bear Paw Apartments: A 43-unit apartment project was approved by the Planning Commission on January 24, 2018. The approval of project has been appealed and the project will be presented to the City Council on April 12, 2018, for final review and decision.

7056 Sunrise Boulevard – Arco Gas Station and Car Wash: Review of a Use Permit and Design Review Permit to allow the construction and operation of a new gas station with convenience store and car wash.




