During the hustle and bustle of the holiday season, it is easy to forget to practice good crime prevention techniques. We encourage everyone to take extra crime prevention measures to lower the risk of becoming a victim of theft. Some tips to remember:



- * Park in well-lit areas
- * Lock and secure all windows and doors when leaving your vehicle
- * Pay attention to your surroundings
- * Do not leave items of value in plain sight (gifts, GPS, phones, purses, computers, etc.)
- * NEVER leave your keys in an unattended vehicle, even for a moment
- * Remove loose change from cup holders
- * Avoid carrying large amounts of cash
- * Don't overload yourself with packages when walking to your vehicle
- * Have your keys ready before you get to your car
- * Report suspicious people or vehicles to CHPD- if it doesn't look or feel right, it probably isn't

Additionally, we encourage all our residents to take advantage of Citrus Heights Police Department's crime prevention program: myproperty@citrusheights.net. This program was implemented in an effort to aid in the recovery of stolen items. Simply photograph valuable belongings such as televisions and computers (including serial numbers) and email the photos to myproperty@citrusheights.net for safekeeping. The photos and corresponding serial numbers are entered into a system utilized by law enforcement agencies nationwide. When stolen items are recovered, anywhere in the country, law enforcement can query the system and locate the owner via the serial number. Too often however, owners have no record of serial numbers which makes it almost impossible to return property to its rightful owner. Photographs of jewelry can also be sent to myproperty@citrusheights.net, thus aiding in the identification of stolen jewelry.

As well, if you will be traveling during the holiday season, make sure your home is secure:

- * Lock every door and window, including the door to your garage
- * Secure sliding doors and pet doors
- * If you have a home security system, activate it
- * Lock up your ladders, tools, and lawn furniture
- * Put valuables in a safe or safety deposit box
- * Remove any keys you have 'hidden' e.g. under the doormat, in the yard, etc.
- * Ask a trusted neighbor to keep an eye on your house and to collect any newspapers, flyers, or mail that might arrive while you are away; make sure they have your contact information
- * Park a car in your driveway
- * Consider putting lights, TVs, or radios on intermittent timers
- * Trim any overgrown shrubbery around perimeter of the house
- * Consider installing motion-sensing lights
- * Avoid posting travel plans on social media

Arcade Creek Park Preserve Grand Opening

The Sunrise Recreation and Park District held a Grand Opening for the Arcade Creek Park Preserve on Saturday, November 1. The site is located on the west side of Sunrise Boulevard, between Sun Hill Drive and Tall River Drive and extends to Sayonara Drive. The neighborhood park/conservation area is a 10 acre Nature Oasis within the City of Citrus Heights featuring looping walking trails, nature themed play pockets, picnic grounds, creek bank restorations to portions of arcade creek, nature interpretation stations, gym quality outdoor fitness equipment, and the areas first public zip line. The park site connects neighborhoods by providing continuous bicycle and pedestrian linkages between Sayonara Drive, Sunrise Boulevard and Bonham Circle, enhancing the City's transportation network. The long anticipated park and conservation area is truly a jewel in the community now open to nature enthusiasts and residents both young and old, providing spectacular views of Arcade Creek amidst an oak woodland and the natural habitats they provide to wildlife. The Park District and its partners, including the State Department of Parks and Recreation, really did a fantastic job in making this project a reality for the community.

Tips for Driving in the Rain

The rainy season is right around the corner. The **Citrus Heights Police Department** wants motorist to be prepared to drive during wet conditions. Please read the following driving tips regarding driving in wet weather.




- 1. **Exercise extreme caution after a long dry spell**. During a dry period, engine oil and grease build up on the road over time. When mixed with water from a new rainfall, the road becomes extremely slick. Continued rainfall will eventually wash away the oil, but the first few hours can be the most dangerous.
- 2. **Allow for more travel time**. You should plan to drive at a slower pace than normal when the roads are wet. Keep in mind that traffic is likely to be moving slower as well. There's also the possibility that your preplanned route may be flooded or jammed. Whatever the case, rushing equals higher risk.



- 3. **Drive slowly and carefully, especially on turns**. Steer and brake with a light touch. When you need to stop or slow, do not brake hard or lock the wheels and risk a skid. If you do find yourself in a skid, remain calm, ease your foot off the gas, and carefully steer in the direction you want the front of the car to go.
- 4. **Avoid hydroplaning** by keeping your tires inflated correctly. Maintain good tire tread. Don't put off replacing worn tires. Slow down when roads are wet, and stay away from puddles. If you find yourself hydroplaning, do not brake hard or turn suddenly. This could throw your car into a skid. Ease your foot off the gas until the car slows. If you need to brake, do it gently.



- 5. **Turn on your headlights**, even when there's a light sprinkle. It helps you see the road, and more importantly, it helps other motorists see you. However, don't blast your high beams in the rain or fog it'll obscure your view further, as the light will reflect back at you off the water droplets in the air.
- 6. **Watch out for pedestrians**. An ordinarily observant pedestrian may become distracted by fiddling with an umbrella or a rain slicker.





- 1. **Stay on top of your car's condition**. Its brakes, tire pressures, tire tread depth and defroster operation should be checked regularly so that you'll be ready to deal with heavy rain when the time comes.
- 2. Make sure that your wipers are in good condition and functioning properly. If the blades are brittle or damaged, replace them before you're caught in a downpour. Some wipers are definitely better than others, so ask your retailer for recommendations.





Save Your Sewer this Holiday Season

It's hard to believe the holidays are, once again, right around the corner. And we all know what that means: many large, delicious meals. Did you know the majority of slow-draining and clogged sewer pipes in residential areas are a result of improper disposal of fats, oils, and grease (FOG)? Learn how to Stop the Clog at home this holiday season and prevent costly sewer backups or overflows by knowing the common sources.

Test your knowledge about FOG with the following facts:

- Common sources of FOG include meat, fatty food scraps, lard, salad dressings, marinades, dairy products, butter or margarine, and shortening.
- Grease doesn't dissolve in hot water or in a garbage disposal.
- Even if FOG makes it down the kitchen drain, it will still stick to pipes after it cools.

Clog prevention is easy! Instead of putting FOG down your kitchen sink, follow these three easy steps for proper disposal:

Can it- Once cooled, pour leftover oils and grease into a sturdy container, like an empty coffee can or glass jar.

- **Scrape it-** Before washing, scrape out fats, oils, and grease residuals from pots, pans, and dishes.
- **Trash it-** Put fatty and greasy food scraps in the garbage, not down the drain.

PROPOSED DIGNITY HEALTH MEDICAL OFFICE BUILDING AND CITY HALL PROJECT UPDATE

The City is currently in the environmental review stage of determining the feasibility of a proposed public -private partnership with Dignity Health and Capital Partners to construct a medical office building and new city hall. If approved, the project would include the construction of a medical office building on the current city hall site and the development of a new city hall on the vacant property on Fountain Square Drive just north of the Post Office.

On October 14, 2014, the City held a Scoping Meeting in the Council Chambers to review the Notice of Preparation (NOP) and receive comments regarding the scope of the EIR. The purpose of the NOP is to notify interested parties that the City will be preparing an EIR for this project. The City anticipates the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) will be available for public review the second week of December.

Animal Services

Holiday Hazards & Weather Warnings

Whether you are hosting holiday parties, traveling or spending a quiet holiday with family, the holiday season can be stressful for you and your pets. A quick list of things to remember this winter!

- If it's too cold for you, it's too cold for your pet! Pets require extra food and water during cold spells to stay warm & hydrated. If your pet must stay outside please provide shelter from the wet and cold. A dog house raised off the ground with warm bedding or straw is usually sufficient. Position door openings away from the wind to prevent heat loss, and if the temperatures will dip below freezing it's best to bring your pet inside.
- Candles, fireplaces & space heaters pose safety threats to pets. Many pets enjoy a cozy space near the hearth, but sparks and cinders can burn paws and singe fur, Overheating is also a concern for younger and older pets. Do not leave pets unattended near flames or electrical cords.
- Holiday Trees and Plants can be hazardous. Certain plants like mistletoe, poinsettias and lilies are poisonous to pets. Christmas trees (fresh or artificial) can be a tipping hazard and should be secured to a ceiling or wall. The pine tree needles (or artificial replicas) can be a source of digestive disruption and a possible trip to the vet! Prevent your pet from drinking the <u>tree water!</u> Preservatives used to keep the tree fresh, flocking, insecticides and flame retardant can make pets sick.
- Ornaments and Decorations can be dangerous! Glass ornaments, the Elf on the Shelf, holiday lights, tinsel, candy canes, popcorn and package decorations can become choking hazards, obstructions in the digestive tract or cause electrocution or injury to the animal's mouth.
- Festive Foods can foil the festivities! Chocolate, certain fruits & nuts, fatty foods, bones (poultry, prime rib, etc.), uncooked dough, alcohol, and their packaging can irritate stomachs, tax nervous systems, cause vomiting, diarrhea and can even cause organ failure or death! Provide your pet with tasty, pet friendly alternatives such as healthy rawhides or catnip!
- A puppy or kitten under the tree has a romantic, nostalgic feel...holiday commercials are full of charming pets with big red bows under a tree, but pet ownership is a family decision and shouldn't be forced upon the family or the pet. Pets that are not wanted or welcome often unnecessarily end up in animal shelters. Gift the animal lovers with pet toys, books on animal care or donations in their name to local animal shelters or pet rescues!

Property crimes are crimes of opportunity. During the holidays, it is easy to forget to practice good crime prevention techniques. The Citrus Heights Police Department would like to encourage you and your loved ones to please take extra crime prevention measures to lower the risk of becoming a victim of theft this holiday season.

Please remember:

- Lock and secure all windows and doors when leaving your vehicle
- Do not leave items of value in plain sight in your vehicle such as wrapped presents, GPS, laptops, newly
 purchased items, cameras, cell phones, tools, purses, briefcases, etc.
- Do not leave personal identification documents in your vehicle such as the title to your vehicle, bank statements, social security cards, pay stubs, mail, etc.
- Park in well lit areas during night
- Install motion lights in front of your residence
- Use anti-theft devices
- NEVER leave your keys in your car
- Write down or take pictures of your serial numbers. Store them in a safe place or email them to myproperty@citrusheights.net so you can provide them to the police in the event that those items are stolen
- If you don't want to keep track of multiple serial numbers, engrave your driver license number on any items of value—this way, you only need to know one number

Construction Projects



Project	Status		
Antelope Road Safe Route to School Project	The design consultant is retaining contractor to positively verify the lateral and vertical locations of several utilities to avoid conflicts during construction. This information will be used to modify the final plan prior to bidding.		
Sylvan Road Accessibility & Safety Improvements Project	The design consultant is retaining contractor to positively verify the lateral and vertical locations of several utilities to avoid conflicts during construction. This information will be used to modify the final plan prior to bidding.		
Area 5 Traffic Safety, Accessibility and Walkability Phase 1B Project	The contractor has completed correction of items on the punch list. Staff will be working to finalize all project paperwork in November and will seek Council's acceptance of the project in December.		
Sunrise/Sungarden Intersection Safety Improvement Project	Teichert Construction began work during the first week of November and is making good progress on the first stage, which is to level and reconstruct the northbound and southbound left-turn pockets. The project is expected to wrap up in April 2015, weather permitting.		
Antelope Road Improvements	TheAntelope corridor has performed well with issues of traffic incidents on 1-80. We are continuing to monitor effect of Casino on traffic.		
SRCC Creek Cleaning	Crews cleaned 48cy of debris from the roadside and creeks in Arcade Creek near Park Drive, Cripple Creek at various locations, Olivine Ave, Mariposa, Antelope Road and Gardenvine. Additionally, 5 bags of trash were removed from Antelope Road near the storage yard.		
Auburn Phase II (Rusch Park to the Northern City Limits)	Following interviews, staff selected Parsons Brinckerhoff and we are currently negotiating a contract with them. Caltrans must review the contract prior to execution. Staff expects to bring the contract to City Council in December.		
2014 Residential Street Resurfacing Program	Central Valley Engineering and Asphalt (CVE), has completed all work on Misty Creek Dr. and West Whyte Ave. CVE is now focused on the smaller streets in the project and anticipates completing all work by early December.		
Areas 8, 9 & 10 Drainage Master Plan Study	The project consultant (West Yost Associates), is currently in the process of investigating three significant drainage issues raised at the public meeting on July 31st to develop comprehensive solutions. Following the additional analysis, City staff will present the final Areas 8, 9, and 10 Drainage Master Plan Study to Council in January.		
Parkoaks Creek Bank Restoration Project	Staff is proceeding with conceptual design of this project. Construction will begin in spring 2015.		
Storm Drain System Yearly Cleaning	Coastline has started cleaning 168,000lf of storm drains in Neighborhood Areas 7, 8 and 9. This work is in progress and will be completed by December 15th.		
Twin Oaks and Mariposa Diversion Pipe (Area 6&7 Master Plan Implementation)	Final plans and specifications for this project are complete. This project will advertise for bids in early December after Thanksgiving break and award in January. Construction will begin as weather permits after that.		
Sunrise Blvd Bus Stop Improvements Project, Phase 2	Location #1 (Sunrise Blvd & Macy Plaza Drive): AT&T had difficulty removing and replacing the old substandard communications vault, and their completion was pushed out to November 21st. While the City's contractor has continued to work on other project components not impacted by the vault, work at the site will be suspended for the duration of the City's Holiday Moratorium (November 21st through January 5th). Prior to suspension of work, the Contractor will clean up the site and restore traffic to all southbound lanes on Sunrise Blvd. Work will resume in early January (weather permitting) and should take about 3-4 to complete.		
Oak Tree Preservation Work	Work on Sunrise to remove cobble stones in the median around the bases of several Heritage Oak trees will continue until December. The cobbles are being relocated to Wintergreen and Old Auburn and will be integrated into the land-scaping for the small landscaped area. This work is ongoing and should wrap up in the spring of 2015.


Sylvan Community Center



Planning Commission

Planning

Commissioners make land use decisions consistent with the policies and plans formally adopted by the City Council; and weigh the professional input given in staff reports, environmental impact reports and consultant reports in making decisions. The Commission may also review proposed city ordinances; the annual Capital Improvement Plan; and other issues related to consistency with the General Plan. Must be a resident of the City of Citrus Heights and at least 18 years of age. Meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m.



History and Arts Commission

History and Arts Commissioners recommend to the City Council the means to implement policies in the General Plan related to historic preservation by developing information and programs to increase awareness of, preservation of and use of historical landmarks, artifacts and other historic materials; develop programs which promote cultural art activities and programs throughout the community; and implement the policies with the General Plan to expand communitywide cultural arts events. Must be either residents of the City of Citrus Heights, descendants of residents of Citrus Heights or former residents and at least 18 years of age. Meetings are held on the first Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m.



Construction Board of Appeals

The Construction Board of Appeals shall consist of five members with who are qualified by experience and training to pass upon matters pertaining to building construction. The members shall neither be officers nor employees of the city. Board Members hear the appeals of persons aggrieved by a decision of the City's Chief Building Official. Relative to the appeal, Board Members determine the suitability of alternate materials and methods of construction and provide reasonable interpretations of the Technical Codes. Must be a resident of the City of Citrus Heights and at least 18 years of age. Meetings are held as needed, and when an appeal is filed.



The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.

Residential Burglaries



Did You Know?

- ⇒ Almost half of residential burglaries occur when property owners leave a door/window/garage door unsecured.
- ⇒ Many burglaries are prevented and/or solved due to neighbors watching out for other neighbor's homes.
- ⇒ Jewelry, laptops, and other electronic items are common targets
- ⇒ Burglaries typically occur during the weekday, while you and your family are away from home.



What role can you play to lower your risk of becoming a victim of this crime?

- ⇒ Lock doors and windows, including garage doors even during the summer months. Use secondary locks to secure windows in unattended rooms.
- ⇒ Look into improving the security hardware of your home to fortify entry points. Sliding glass doors should have dowels and vertical locks to prevent their removal from tracks and forced entry.
- ⇒ Trim dense bushes and low hanging trees that reduce the visibility of your property, especially those areas that block entryways and windows.
- ⇒ Get to know your neighbors and ask them to call the police if they see anything suspicious.
- ⇒ Take photos of serialized items, along with a close up photo of the serial number. Send the photos along with your driver's license number to myproperty@citrusheights.net so we can store them in case you become a victim.





If you come home and think someone may have broken into your residence, <u>do not</u> go inside.

Immediately call 9-1-1 so police officers can check if the house is safe for you to enter.
