Community Events

Christmas Tree Lighting Event

The 18th Annual Christmas Tree Lighting attracted more than 1200 people. The evening started with music performed by the Citrus Heights Marching Band and holiday greetings by Mayor Mel Turner and City Council Members, followed by dance performances from the O'Sullivan Academy of Irish Dance. Santa and Council flipped the switch on the 43-foot Christmas Tree to light the entire City Hall parking lot.

The festivities continued in the Citrus Heights Community Center with complimentary cookies, hot cocoa, mochas, musical performances, train rides, cookie decorating and pictures with Santa.

The event was sponsored by the City of Citrus Heights, Sunrise Mall, Sunrise Marketplace and Republic Services. Additional contributions were made by 7-11 on San Juan Avenue, TLC Catering and Abel's Christmas Trees in Citrus Heights.

City's first DC Fast Charging Station for Electric Vehicles

In December the City issued Building Permits to SMUD for the City's first DC Fast Charging Station for Electric Vehicles. The charging station will be located at Antelope Crossing (in front of Raley's at 7825 Lichen Drive).

The charging station will include two DC Fast chargers (capable of fully charging an electric vehicle in 30 minutes) as well as a Level 2 charging station.

According to SMUD this will be the first universally ADA accessible (all three chargers) charging station in the State. The station is strategically located in Citrus Heights along the I-80 corridor and will be the easternmost publically available fast chargers in SMUD territory. The project is a \$341,000 SMUD investment into the community. SMUD is partnering with Weingarten real estate to make the stations available for a reasonable charge.

SMUD aims to have the station available by January 1, 2015. A grand opening and ribbon cutting will be announced as the construction nears completion.

6th Annual Holiday Referral Program

We are pleased to announce that our annual holiday program was a wonderful success. 59 families were adopted. We handed out 65 turkeys and the families were able to "shop" for clothing that was donated as well, prior to receiving their gifts.

Our adopted families included 76 adults and 154 children, who received gifts, food boxes and toiletry baskets. Additional food boxes and toiletry baskets were donated to Lichen School to give to their families in need which included 14 adults and 50 children. The families picked up their items Tuesday, December 16th and got to meet Santa at the City's Community Center.

Tips for Driving in the Rain

The rainy season is right around the corner. The **Citrus Heights Police Department** wants motorist to be prepared to drive during wet conditions. Please read the following driving tips regarding driving in wet weather.

1. Exercise extreme caution after a long dry spell. During a dry period, engine oil and grease build up on the road over time. When mixed with water from a new rainfall, the road becomes extremely slick. Continued rainfall will eventually wash away the oil, but the first few hours can be the most dangerous.

2. Allow for more travel time. You should plan to drive at a slower pace than normal when the roads are wet. Keep in mind that traffic is likely to be moving slower as well. There's also the possibility that your preplanned route may be flooded or jammed. Whatever the case, rushing equals higher risk.

3. Drive slowly and carefully, especially on turns. Steer and brake with a light touch. When you need to stop or slow, do not brake hard or lock the wheels and risk a skid. If you do find yourself in a skid, remain calm, ease your foot off the gas, and carefully steer in the direction you want the front of the car to go.

4. Avoid hydroplaning by keeping your tires inflated correctly. Maintain good tire tread. Don't put off replacing worn tires. Slow down when roads are wet, and stay away from puddles. If you find yourself hydroplaning, do not brake hard or turn suddenly. This could throw your car into a skid. Ease your foot off the gas until the car slows. If you need to brake, do it gently.


5. **Turn on your headlights**, even when there's a light sprinkle. It helps you see the road, and more importantly, it helps other motorists see you. However, don't blast your high beams in the rain or fog — it'll obscure your view further, as the light will reflect back at you off the water droplets in the air.

6. Watch out for pedestrians. An ordinarily observant pedestrian may become distracted by fiddling with an umbrella or a rain slicker.

Now that you know how to drive in the rain, take some precautionary measures to ensure that your vehicle is prepared to get you through a downpour.

1. Stay on top of your car's condition. Its brakes, tire pressures, tire tread depth and defroster operation should be checked regularly so that you'll be ready to deal with heavy rain when the time comes.

2. Make sure that your wipers are in good condition and functioning properly. If the blades are brittle or damaged, replace them before you're caught in a downpour. Some wipers are definitely better than others, so ask your retailer for recommendations.











PROPOSED DIGNITY HEALTH MEDICAL OFFICE BUILDING AND CITY HALL PROJECT

On December 12th, the Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) on the City Hall / Medical Office Building project was released for public review. The proposal consists of two components – a new City Hall building and a new Medical Office building. The Medical Office Building would be located at the corner of Greenback Lane and Fountain Square Drive, which is the location of the City's existing City Hall complex. The new City Hall would move slightly to the north on Fountain Square Drive (next to the Post Office). Details about the proposed project are contained within the Draft EIR and are also available on the City's website.

This Draft EIR has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Release of the Draft EIR commences a 45-day public review period. Members of the community are invited to review the Draft EIR and submit comments on the adequacy of the EIR during the 45-day review period. The Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on January 14th, 2015, during which oral comments on the Draft EIR can be provided. The focus of the January 14th meeting is the Draft EIR, specifically receiving comments from the public on the Draft EIR. There will not be any discussion about the overall project details, including any financial details, at this meeting. The January 14th meeting is focused solely on the environmental aspects of the project. Written comments can be submitted through January 26th.

The Draft EIR can be viewed on the City's website, <u>www.citrusheights.net/327/Environmental-Documents</u>. It can also be viewed in the lobby of City Hall and at the Sylvan Library during normal business hours. Copies of the Draft EIR will be available on CD for free to interested residents. Hard copies of the Draft EIR will also be available for purchase for \$38. Following the public review period of the Draft EIR, all of the comments received on the Draft EIR will be reviewed. A Final EIR will be prepared, which will address comments that were submitted on the Draft EIR.

The Planning Commission and City Council will likely consider whether to approve the project or not in March 2015. Part of their deliberations will include the EIR. Their deliberations will also include other requested entitlements and potential financial agreements.

Pedestrian Master Plan Community Workshop

Animal Services

Holiday Hazards & Weather Warnings

Whether you are hosting holiday parties, traveling or spending a quiet holiday with family, the holiday season can be stressful for you and your pets. A quick list of things to remember this winter!

- If it's too cold for you, it's too cold for your pet! Pets require extra food and water during cold spells to stay warm & hydrated. If your pet must stay outside please provide shelter from the wet and cold. A dog house raised off the ground with warm bedding or straw is usually sufficient. Position door openings away from the wind to prevent heat loss, and if the temperatures will dip below freezing it's best to bring your pet inside.
- Candles, fireplaces & space heaters pose safety threats to pets. Many pets enjoy a cozy space near the hearth, but sparks and cinders can burn paws and singe fur, Overheating is also a concern for younger and older pets. Do not leave pets unattended near flames or electrical cords.
- Holiday Trees and Plants can be hazardous. Certain plants like mistletoe, poinsettias and lilies are poisonous to pets. Christmas trees (fresh or artificial) can be a tipping hazard and should be secured to a ceiling or wall. The pine tree needles (or artificial replicas) can be a source of digestive disruption and a possible trip to the vet! Prevent your pet from drinking the *tree water*! Preservatives used to keep the tree fresh, flocking, insecticides and flame retardant can make pets sick.
- Ornaments and Decorations can be dangerous! Glass ornaments, the Elf on the Shelf, holiday lights, tinsel, candy canes, popcorn and package decorations can become choking hazards, obstructions in the digestive tract or cause electrocution or injury to the animal's mouth.
- Festive Foods can foil the festivities! Chocolate, certain fruits & nuts, fatty foods, bones (poultry, prime rib, etc.), uncooked dough, alcohol, and their packaging can irritate stomachs, tax nervous systems, cause vomiting, diarrhea and can even cause organ failure or death! Provide your pet with tasty, pet friendly alternatives such as healthy rawhides or catnip!
- A puppy or kitten under the tree has a romantic, nostalgic feel...holiday commercials are full of charming pets with big red bows under a tree, but pet ownership is a family decision and shouldn't be forced upon the family or the pet. Pets that are not wanted or welcome often unnecessarily end up in animal shelters. Gift the animal lovers with pet toys, books on animal care or donations in their name to local animal shelters or pet rescues!

Area 5 Traffic Safety, Accessibility and Walkability Phase 1B Project	Staff will be working to finalize all project paperwork in November and will seek Council's acceptance of the project i early January.			
Sunrise/Sungarden Intersection Safety Improvement Project	Teichert Construction (Teichert) has completed reconstructing the center medians and repaving the turn pockets as part of the first stage of work. Due to weather and the upcoming Holiday, the City and Teichert have agreed to suspen all work on the project until after the New Year. Weather permitting, Teichert will begin work on reconstructing the curb & gutter, sidewalk and bus stopping pad along the east side of Sunrise in early January 2015. Because of safety concerns over the elevation difference between the northbound and southbound lanes on Sunrise Boulevard, the left-turn pockets will remain closed during the work suspension.			
Antelope Road Improvements	Nothing new to report			
SRCC Creek Cleaning	Crews cleaned Brooktree Creek from San Juan to Dewey; 8 yards of material from an illegal dump in a drainage ditch on Old Auburn near the bike trail. The concrete channel at Mariposa and San Simeon was cleaned. Cripple Creek near Glen Tree and Garryanna was cleared.			
Auburn Phase II (Rusch Park to the Northern City Limits)	City Council awarded a design services contract to Parsons Brinckerhoff on December 11th.			
2014 Residential Street Resurfacing Program	Central Valley Engineering and Asphalt (CVE), has complete 7 of the 10 streets and continues to work on 3 remaining streets, but work has been slowed somewhat due to the recent weather. CVE is still focused on completing all work in December if the weather permits.			
Areas 8, 9 & 10 Drainage Master Plan Study	Analysis of all locations identified in the Master Plan is nearly complete. City staff will present the final Areas 8, 9, and 10 Drainage Master Plan Study to Council in January or February.			
Parkoaks Creek Bank Restoration Project	Staff is proceeding with conceptual design of this project. Construction will begin in spring 2015.			
Storm Drain System Yearly Cleaning	ning Coastline has completed approximately 168,000lf of storm drain cleaning in Neighborhood Areas 7, 8, 9 and 10. Sta has added some spot locations to clean that typically have obstructions due to proximity to trees that drop a large amount of leaves. Multiple locations were cleaned in anticipation of the storm last week and crews remained in the during the storm to assist with drainage inlets that were clogged with leaves.			
Twin Oaks and Mariposa Diversion Pipe (Area 6&7 Master Plan Implementation)	Final plans and specifications for this project are complete. This project will advertise for bids in early December after Thanksgiving break and award in January. Construction will begin as weather permits after that.			
Sunrise Blvd Bus Stop Improvements Project, Phase 2	Nothing new to report			
Oak Tree Preservation Work	Work on Sunrise to remove cobble stones in the median around the bases of several Heritage Oak trees will continue until December. The cobbles are being relocated to Wintergreen and Old Auburn and will be integrated into the land- scaping for the small landscaped area. This work is ongoing and should wrap up in the spring of 2015.


Sylvan Community Center



Citrus Heights First-Time Homebuyer Program

Need Help Purchasing a Home? THE CITY CAN HELP!

The City's First-Time Homebuyer program provides low-interest loans of up to \$40,000 to low-income homebuyers that may be used for a down payment and closing costs.

Low-Interest Loans

The low-interest loan is structured as a second mortgage. The loan will have a rate of 3.00%, a term of 30 years with no required monthly payments. The total sum of the loan, with interest, will be due at the end of the 30-year term, upon sale or transfer of the property or if the borrower no longer occupies the home as their primary residence. The borrower must contribute a minimum of 1.00% of the purchase price. The actual amount of assistance is based on financial capacity.




